



# Conversation's Regal Return

"THIS IS A CELEBRATION of the dining room," says New York-based designer Corev Damen Jenkins. "In here, it's all about putting down the cell phone and enjoying great, memorable conversations." He feted the resurgence by charting tented rooms from Napoleon I through Mario Buatta, then adding his own "Cirque du Soleil meets Met Gala couture" spin with almost 240 yards of sapphire-toned fabric (tented by French Finish). Along with being an acoustic win for lively dinner parties, "the canopy is the wow factor," says the designer, who opted for two round quartz tables for more intimate gatherings-or, of course, afternoon study hall.

#### A Wondrous Welcome

IN THE HANDS of a Dallas landscape designer with a cool command of architecture and a classics-leaning interior designer, an escalating continuum escorts visitors from the formal Georgian exterior into a fantastical fover. Daniel Houchard of From the Ground Up Landscape flanked the front door with a pair of scaled-down parterns. slowing quests to a stroll as they cross into John Robbitt's double-height fower where he transports visitors through a dramatic mingling of delightful and serious elements. Chief among them is an 18-foot tree chandelier soaring to the ceiling. Bobbitt employed this surrealist element to counterbalance the strong classicism of the room. "I'm an academic at heart," says Bobbitt, whose series of grisaille panels featuring the goddess Psyche confirms class is indeed in session.

# Divine Moments of Optimism

FOR A MASCULINE LOUNGE and accompanying terrace. Ken Fulk happily donned two bats-decorator and fortune teller-to stage a heavenly harbinger of his own design. "These spaces reflect my personal optimism for the reawakening that's happening all around us," he says. In the garden, a trio of classical figures surrounds a commanding armillary as Fulk's homage to the three fates-Clotho, Lachesis, and Atropos-and the rites of spring. Inside, gilded constellations of gold embroidery embellish sapphire velvet upholstered walls and a custom rug, bringing the dazzling night skyscape down to earth, As a reminder of good things to come. Fulk drafted special tarot cards for the space.

### Captivating Kitchen Islands

STINDISE RDEAKEAST HITR or late-night speakease? Both have the power to draw a crowd, starting with 6F designer Gil Melott's main-floor kitchen anchored by an expansive island "reminiscent of a piece of marble furniture that might have been collected on a trip to Italy," says the designer. And by adding a 14-foot window. be turned natural light and garden hues into essential players in the tonal palette. Just below, in the basement, Bryan and Mike Yates of Yates Desven fashioned an after-hours counterpoint with a gravity-defying cantilevered island, wallnaper that reads like paint layered over time, and intoxicating aged brass.

#### Salons Brimming with Objets d'Art

Designer Michael Aiduss referenced insouciant French interiors from the 1920s to 60s to inform the living room, which he rooted in classicism. "The room feels as if a generation of beautiful, collected objects has casually made its way here," explains the designer, who confidently pairs a monumental 18-foot-long Chinese black lacquer screen alongside a Karl Springer coffee table next to audacious chairs upholstered in a Radziwillian tieer pattern. Quiet strié walls in commanding stone gray-and edged in indigo-by decorative painter Barry Martin put the assembled-over-time arrangement at ease "There's a sense of serene luxury here that I think matches how people live today," says Aiduss.



## Retreats to Ravishing Places

Scenic wallpapers and chic nods to romantic idylls transform bedrooms and corridors into cozy odysseys abroad.

"RED IS OFTEN ESCHEWED in places of repose," says Alexa Hampton, who set out to "show how red is done in a bedroom." Integral to this was an outsize journey to the City of Light, with a trompe I oeil wallcovering of her own design masking as framed maps of Paris. "It serves as a tonic for the rich reds in the tea paper," adds Hampton, noting the inherent rigor in itsgrid, a counterpoint to the room's sumptuousness. "I call this the Jaipur Room for the lacquered pink celling inspired by the walls of the Rajasthani city," says Martyn Lawrence Bullard, who paired this with a parchment style Ananhō French wallpaper reminiscent of a Ballinese forest

#### Spa Treatments. Reimagined

"I WANTED THIS POOM to feel old, as if it was later converted to a bath with the bones of what once was," says Brant McFarlain, who modernized the layout with the help of a polished wood partition so functional areas are centralized rather than lining the walls. And naired with the custom plaster ceiling, traditionally utilitarian bath elements become sculptural centerpieces.





#### Slim Aarons-Style Reverie

THE SUN SHINES brightly in Texas. turning cool canopies into decadent design triumphs—and brilliant opportunities to marry architecture with the natural world. 'I wanted to do something more traditional that would fit with the Georgian vernacular," says designer Robin Henry, whose poolside geranium pink-and-white tent beckons with cozy furniture and a glass lantern. Henry outfitted the terrace between the pool and house with a breezy mix of rattan furniture, including vintageinspired loungers and woven wicker stools with custom terry cushions.

\*OUR PALETTE was inspired by a still-life photo of fruit-rich plum, warm papaya, hints of pinks. reds, and chestnut," says designer Liz MacPhail of her basement wine cellar and lounge enveloped in Brazilian quartzite and high-gloss aubergine paint. A snakeskin-patterned banquette with sexy bullion fringe, along with sleek refrigerator columns and pink stone walls, turns wine cellars' masculine-leaning trope on its head-we'll raise a glass to that. +
